

- 5. Letter from Bishop Linda Nicholls to the churches of the Huron Diocese. Stresses importance of Vestry meetings that are dynamic and set goals as well as the importance of saying thank you and approving a balanced budget.
- 6. Discussion of UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples. There will be a chance for a community blanket ceremony at St. Mary's, Walkerville, church in the future.

 Motion: That the parish of St. Matthew's Windsor commit to hosting and/or partnering with other churches in Essex Deanery in an educational event (such as a workshop/program/series) on the UN Declaration on the Right of Indigenous peoples in its community in 2017. And engage in the Blanket Exercise in 2017. And the parish leaders of St. Matthew's, Windsor, commit to engage its mayor and municipal leaders in 2017 about the UN Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples and encourage the local council to establish a process to review and endorse the Declaration if it has not already done so.

Moved by Janet Williams. Second by Cathy MacKendrick. Carries unanimously.

7. a) Motion to accept Vestry reports. Moved by Doug Warford. Second by Cora Braidford. Passed.

Deacon Cathy MacKendrick describes excitement and early success of sewing program at the detention center for inmates.

Correction to Bob Braidford's warden report on p. 20, third last paragraph, refers to estimate to replace peaked roof – should be <u>flat</u> roof.

7 b). Financial Reports:

Envelope secretary: Beth Felet. Decrease in number of donors in part due to the renovation campaign. General apportionment donations for day-to-day expenses were down about 4.5%. As those erode, it is harder to keep church operations and our outreach programs going and pay our apportionment. Down about \$6,000 and could be down by \$8,400 this year but if the 85 regular donors each gave an extra \$8.23 a month, we would be in good financial shape. Thanks to Beth for all her hard work.

Motion that report be accepted. Moved by Beth Felet, Second by Margaret Jemison. Passed.

Summary of Renew renovations: Treasurer Jane Patterson reports that the total renovation project cost \$113,281 and has been paid for. There was more than \$70,000 in donations received and we accessed funds from some trusts and memorial fund for total of \$108,000, leaving about \$5,300 to be funded from surplus funds.

Year-end 2016: It was a complex and challenging year for St. Matthews. Capital expenses included renovations as well as acquiring an organ so ending the year with a \$9,600 deficit is actually a good job. It includes \$4,300 deficit in operations. Balance sheet about \$9,000 in bequests. \$740 short on organ fund but it will be paid off. Some of the pledges are monthly payments through June. We are starting to rebuild Memorial Fund. Move statements by Jane Patterson, Second by Ann Hucal. Passed. Thank you to Jane for taking on job of Treasurer.

Budget for 2017: Hoping for increase in donations and anticipate need for \$6,000 for flat roof repairs. Most expenses are unchanged. Rector's stipend up in keeping with diocesan recommendation. Apportionment is our contribution to the Diocesan church to be dispersed for health care for retired clergy, ministries, contribute to Diocesan contribution to national church. It shows we are part of the larger church. The amount is based on operating expenses of each church. A 2.5% increase in organist fees. Predicting a balanced budget. Approval of report moved by Jane Patterson. Second by John Rossi. Passed.

8. Nominating Committee Report: 2017 Parish Council. Need alternate lay delegate for synod. Hearing none, will leave that position vacant and look to appoint someone later. Move to accept report: Moved by Mary Lou Drake, second by Cora Braidford. Passed.

9. New Business:

Property: Onorio Felet outlines some of the little things that must be tended to each week and help is requested. Bigger items: the roof over the hall is about 50 years old while other portions have been replaced but a new roof was put over the old one. Only been few leaks but could be water sandwiched between the two. Hoping fixes to the flat roof will extend its life for a year or two until we can afford to replace it at a cost of about \$77,000. Not doing it now because after two big fundraising campaigns we need a breather.

Idea is raised to remove the water fountain to save money. It is used a lot but we can put a timer on it so it is not running at all times and using hydro.

Request that we look at updating the state of the bathrooms, including new wallpaper.

Parish asked to think of new creative ways to fundraise so not always tapping the usual donors. Suggestion that we seek donations to pay for food etc. and it was pointed out that happens a lot but parish not always aware of the generosity that occurs.

Accessibility issues: New lighting has helped in the parish. For those with hearing difficulty, we are seeking ideas to help them. Onorio is also working on getting a light over the pulpit for lectors.

Meeting called to order, 12:13 p.m. Opening prayer, Rev'd Andreas.

Motion to elect Alisa Yednoroz as Vestry clerk. Moved by Margaret Kissau. Second by Beth Felet. Approved.

Purpose of meeting: To discuss necessary repairs to the flat roof (excluding Parish Hall), and to consider a motion to apply for a Diocesan Revolving Loan for a maximum of \$70,000.00. We have an aging and leaking roof that needs repair and we need a loan in addition to fundraising to pay for it.

Richard Hucal: We have a flat roof system with five flat roofs, one over the hall, one from over the kitchen to the warden's office and nursery, one over narthex, another one that covers the two aisles and fifth one over the furnace. Sixth roof is the shingled one.

We learned from the first estimates it would be quite pricey for a BUR (built-up roof) and that the tar used in the past is now carcinogenic so the formula of a tar roof today is different and is expensive and not a good solution. "T" is a chemical version, like a pool liner that sits over the roof and is sealed along the seams and needs ballast to keep it down. It does not hold up as well as the "E" roof that is a rubber membrane that sits on top of the flat roof and is not as expensive. Four levels of roof really need repair whereas the roof over the hall can last a few more years. The north side shingles also need repair.

The first roof we put on was a BUR. When it started leaking, instead of replacing it they added some insulation and put a new roof on top. We need to remove the old roof, which will cost about \$20,000 because it is labour-intensive. Then we will have a clean deck to start again with a layer of Styrofoam screwed down, then a fully-adhered roof with glue on the whole rubber membrane so it won't blow away and we don't need ballast. In the future, we will be able to easily locate a leak with this system. And the new roof will be lower, allowing for a deeper pool of water before it starts spilling over the flashing.

Quotes to date were quite varied. We need to do a bit more research on roofer with the best quote because they are relatively new to the roofing business. Work can't be done until spring so we have time to get more information and quotes. \$67,000 is the estimated cost, including removal of old roof, as well as putting new shingles on the north side (peaked roof) of the church.

To switch and not have a flat roof would be more expensive. Bob Kissau says roofers can slope the insulation about 3 inches to help with drainage. Roof work we are looking at comes with some sloping but not sure how much.

Question about adhesives ability to work in temperature extremes, assured it does.

Warranty would be 15 years; if it leaks, it gets fixed. Trying to get 20 years.

Motion: In view of the current state of the leaking church roof that we seek approval from Vestry to seek a loan in the amount of \$50,000 to cover the cost of the new roof. Moved by Gordon Drake. Second by Cathy MacKendrick.

We have raised some money so we don't need to borrow full \$70,000. We have \$8,000 collected to date and a trust for \$10,000.

The loan is a fixed rate of 4% interest rate for the first four years. In fifth year interest starts going up 1 percent a year and would repay one –tenth of the principal each year over 10 years but our aim would be to pay it off sooner.

Bishop wants a vision plan for each church and part of that plan includes future plans such as rest of the roof. This is raised to answer a question about being diligent in taking in what could be higher costs and other expenses in the future such as rest of the roof, parking lot etc. into our consideration.

Richard Hucal: Strongly recommend we ask for up to \$70,000 in case the cost is more to repair the flat roof once they get started on the job.

Proposed friendly amendment (R. Hucal): to seek loan of up to \$70,000.

Gordon withdraws original motion.

New motion Moved by Gordon Drake, Seconded by Cathy MacKendrick: In view of the current state of the leaking roof, we seek approval from Vestry to request a loan up to a maximum of \$70,000 to cover the cost of the new roof. Repair will include the flat roof and repair of the north shingled roof, excluding the church hall.

Discussion: Application is to Grants and Loans, a subcommittee of the Diocesan Council. They meet quarterly; next one is in the new year.

Question about a revolving loan to address projects that come our way. Andreas said that diocesan loans are approved for specific projects. Diocese calls it a revolving loan because of the nature of the interest rate changing in the fifth year. Initial quotes were as high as \$188,000 to do all the roofs. This is much less.

Vote is called. 35 in favor. 1 opposed. 2 abstain. Carries.

Vestry adjourned.

- Leftover CCFM items were sold at the Christmas event to raise funds for the roof. We raised almost \$300 for the cause.

Recommendations for next year:

- Next year's date is either Saturday November 10, or 17 2018.
- Print business cards with details and internet links, will be distributed at our main events. The
 cards will be ready for the spring rummage sale. The CCFM could advertise our rummage sale
 if the date were set in advance. We did not advertise our rummage sale at the CCFM.

The year 2017 has been a period of both excitement and new challenges for the Parish Church of St. Matthew as we carry out our mission statement "We are called to share God's love as we welcome and care for our community." Your wardens Janet Williams and Gordon Drake are pleased to present the following report to Vestry.

Mission and Ministry Plan: Our Bishop Linda Nicholls has challenged all parishes in the diocese of Huron to think creatively about their future as they assemble a Mission and Ministry Plan for the five-year period 2018–2022. The document is to be submitted to the Annual Vestry meeting for 2018, and to the Diocese by March, 2018. This is an important opportunity to identify a way forward for our parish, to identify a mission purpose, and to create concrete goals to support that purpose. Thanks to the efforts of our Mission and Ministry Task Force, we have now completed the task of filling out the template that provided an overall structure for the planning activities. This provided an opportunity to get to know our parish better, and to participate in an important planning exercise for the future. The results are summarized in a very useful document "Mission & Ministry Plan for St. Matthew's Anglican Church" prepared by our Rector Andreas Thiel. It covers the five main areas of activity: Evangelism, Discipling, Service, Transforming Society, and Safeguarding and Renewing the Earth. Thanks to Mike Herrington, Alisa Yednoroz, Ginny and Bill McAdam, Rev'd. Cathy MacKendrick, and Chair Rev'd. Andreas Thiel for their service on the Mission and Ministry Task Force.

Apportionment: Our entire apportionment has been paid for the year.

Finances: We would like to express our appreciation for the generosity of our parishioners and friends in support of the many ministries of St. Matthew's Parish Church. We have accomplished much during the past year, and ended with a small surplus after a total of \$157,546 in expenses. Much remains to be done in order to meet our capital expenses, especially for the new roof.

The budget for the coming year will be discussed separately. The total expenses are about the same, including \$6008 in loan repayments for the new roof.

Cookbook Launch: The delicious recipes from our brilliant cookbook have attracted many buyers since the launch on Easter Sunday. They are still available as wonderful gifts for birthdays, showers, Fathers Day, and your own gourmet kitchen.

PWRDF Cheque: We are pleased to say that our cheque for \$1513.15, raised mainly from the Lenten soup lunches for the Primate's World Relief and Development Fund (PWRTF), was announced to Canon Greg Smith on May 21. He was also the guest speaker. A small luncheon followed the service.

Kingfisher Lake: The Oji-Cree First Nation Reserve at Kingfisher Lake 350 km north of

Sioux Lookout, is in continuing need for nutritious food due to high transportation costs. To help alleviate these costs, we are in partnership with St. Mary's Anglican Church and the Windsor Flying Club to fly food supplies to the village. Our share consists of tooth brushes, tooth paste, and nutritious snacks.

Roof: The record-breaking rain on August 29, 2017 made obvious the sad state of repair of the flat portion of our roof over the Narthex and Choir room. Thanks to the availability new membrane materials, Council was delighted to learn that the cost of resurfacing the flat part of the roof would be considerably less than previously thought. The resurfacing is still urgently needed, but it now seems likely that the cost for doing the flat portion of the roof (excluding the Church Hall) and north side of the shingled main roof will be in the neighbourhood of \$75,000. We have received a rich trove of fund-raising ideas, and now have a fund-raising committee to put the ideas into action. Thanks to Jane Patterson, Mary Grace Weir and Janis Fantinic for their service on this committee. The goal is achievable, and when done it will assure the continued viability of St. Matthew's Church for decades to come.

Property: Just as for your home, St. Matthew's Church requires constant upkeep and maintenance. With Onorio Felet's regular vigilance we are keeping on top of things, but he needs help with small repairs and other initiatives to improve our worship space. We would like to put together a maintenance committee of 5 or 6 people to work on these projects. Please let us know if you are interested in serving on the maintenance committee.

Donations: The Taqtaq family has donated a mosaic made in Damascus. The mosaic now hangs on the wall near the choir to create a separate prayer space. Money from the Memorial fund was used to make a proper frame for the mosaic. Many thanks to the Taqtaq family for their generosity!

Outreach: A motion was approved to allow Canterbury ElderCollege to make occasional use of the Church Hall for the courses that it runs for the benefit of seniors over the age of 55. The fees charged for the courses are nominal, and the courses are taught entirely by volunteers. In this way, people are brought into the Church who would not otherwise be there, and St. Matthew's contributes to the broader Anglican Community.

In other forms of outreach, Deacon Rev'd. Cathy has arranged teams of volunteers who are warmly welcomed into Marlborough Public School to serve hot Monday morning breakfasts. Also, the inmates in the local jail are taking great pride in the curtains they have made, and the women are now experimenting with a new way to make pillow cases. This programme is having an important impact on their morale, and development of skills that they can use after being released.

In summary, St. Matthew's continues its tradition of providing a warm and friendly parish family, rich in fellowship and the Christian spirit. The annual talent show in January, pancake dinner for Shrove Tuesday, soup lunches during Lent and Advent, and weekly coffee hours after the Sunday morning service are prime examples of the fellowship we share. These

complement the weekly celebrations of the Eucharist featuring inspirational sermons by our Rector, the Rev'd. Andreas Thiel, and excellent music provided by our enthusiastic choir and Music Director Mike Ricketts. Many thanks to those who serve on the Parish Council and various committees. Thanks to all who contribute their time and energy to the life of the Parish Church of St. Matthew.

Deacon's Report

The Rev'd Cathy MacKendrick

Servers: Our server group is small but mighty doing wonderful ministry for St. Matthews. It is such a privilege to work with such efficient, kind, and thoughtful youth in our community. We are truly blessed to have them enhance our worship. Although many of the faithful servers have moved on to higher education, we anticipate adding to our number in 2018.

Marlborough Breakfast Programme: There were 28 members of the congregation who help cook a hot breakfast and/or prepare 6 dozen muffins for the hungry children at Marlborough School. We also donated \$800 to the Nutrition Programme which adds to the infrastructure of the kitchen area near the cafeteria and provides appropriate space for the new Culinary programme, run by one of the teachers with experience as a chef, where students learn the basics of cooking which is shared with the other students in the school. We are feeding 55 to 70 students on Mondays. The principal and vice-principal are very grateful for everything that we do.

Southwest Detention Centre: The Diocesan Golf Tournament Committee supported this programme with a grant of \$800.00 for which we are grateful. \$400 of it we used to purchase a good guitar for the Rev Randy Dyer (chaplain) to use with the male inmates to create a praise band and to offer lessons with a volunteer from another church in town.

The Backpack programme continues with about 50 packs provided for the inmates who are being discharged "to the street". Each backpack has a bath towel, washcloth, underwear, socks, roll of toilet paper, tube of toothpaste, toothbrush, shampoo, soap, deodorant, Kleenex and condoms. This past year the condoms were supplied by the Health Unit at no cost which is helpful. In the cold months a hat, scarf and gloves are added to the backpacks. Our Lenten and Maundy Thursday special outreach collection and other regular donations have covered the cost of this ministry.

We have participated in the "Sewing Programme" for the women inmates at the Southwest Detention Centre with the Rev'd Jane Piercy-Ballard (Church of Epiphany, Kingsville) and Natalie, her volunteer, as well as Jean Muhleisen. This year the women have created curtains for their quiet room and for a Christmas decoration for their range. There are seven projects that they can work on each week. At the end of this year we were joined by Peggy from Church of the Ascension and Jeannie Hopkins from St. Stephen's Oldcastle as teachers. It means that every once in a while we will have a Monday afternoon off. How wonderful that churches work together in ministry.

We continue to take paperback books, puzzle books, dice, chess pieces, jigsaw puzzles, and Sudoku and crossword books, crayons, and colouring books, dictionaries, and address books are greatly appreciated too.

Thanks to all those who contribute money, items, time to pack and delivery items to the Centre as well as knitters.

Food for the Hungry: Last year we decided to distribute our food donations to some different Food Banks in various locations in the city. They are:

- Winter months Street Help for the Homeless
- Easter Season Downtown Mission
- June to Thanksgiving Welcome Home Centre for homeless women
- Thanksgiving to Christmas Windsor Homes Coalition Inc. inner city

The cupboard for collecting donations has been placed in the Narthex and it has proven to be very helpful. We are grateful to the McAdams, John Rossi, Louise Davis and Roger Wurdemann for helping to take these items to the various agencies during the year. Many hands make light work.

Hiatus House: This ministry is facilitated by Pauline and Don Patterson who faithfully take our donations do the shelter for abused women and their children. Thanks to them for their care for these vulnerable people.

Christmas Angel Tree: Through Prison Ministry Canada, several members of the congregation have purchased and delivered Christmas presents to the children of inmates from their parents. For those of us who have participated it has been a mixed blessing. We are strangers to the caregivers who sometimes do not know we will be contacting them. However, when we do we are met with warmth, conversation and sometimes even a hug.

Thank-you to everyone who contributes to these outreach ministries with their resources of time and money. Together we make a big difference. God has truly blessed us all!

Rector's Report to Vestry – February 4, 2018

"...whatever is true, whatever is honourable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things." - Phillipians 4:8

Dear St. Matthew's family,

I am honoured to be serving as your priest and pastor, and to be offering my report for our Annual Vestry meeting for the fifth time. At vestry, we are given the opportunity to reflect on the GOOD NEWS. The good news begins with the fact that through baptism, we are made members of the Body of Christ. The good news includes the fact that we are brought into relationship with God and with one another here in South Windsor; in this faith community we embody a unique and local expression of the Body of Christ. And the good news is that within the unique context of St. Matthew's, God's saving work is active and alive among us — sometimes in ways that are only partially known to us, at others, in ways that take our breath away. There is *much* to give thanks for. There is *much* to rejoice over. And as we take our cue from St. Paul's Letter to the Phillipians, we consider all the things that are "worthy of praise," because by praising, we express gratitude to God who makes ALL these things possible.

I recently came across a letter, addressed to members of a Windsor congregation, written by their Rector. Here is an excerpt: "... our prime problem is encouraging all our congregation to come to Church regularly... If you will come to Church regularly – and we sincerely hope you will – all other problems will solve themselves." The congregation was St. Matthew's and the year was 1967. It appears that at least one person felt that Sunday attendance was something to be concerned about! Here we are, some 50 years later, in an era where much has changed in society: the introduction of Sunday shopping; the proliferation of Sunday sports activities; more demands being made on families – particularly single-parent families; the challenges of balancing work schedules with times for rest; a much more "secular" environment. And yet... here at St. Matthew's I see people – young and old – who have made a conscious decision to commit themselves to the promises made at baptism: to continue "in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of bread, and in the prayers." In countless ways, you lend your hearts and minds (as well as numerous other gifts and abilities) to our common worship and common life. This is a good thing, and worthy of celebration!

In 2018, we installed Janet Williams and Gordon Drake as our Churchwardens. I have appreciated their faithful leadership. Along with the other members of Parish Council,

St. Matthew's is extremely well served. When you read the comprehensive Wardens' Report to Vestry, you'll be reminded of some of the highlights of this past year.

I commend to you the item which is new to our Vestry package: the **Mission and Ministry Plan**. You will notice some initiatives that are in the planning stages, such as an intergenerational, informal church experience (aka "Messy Church"). We'll also offer an alternate worship service for those who are unable to attend Sunday morning worship. Once again, it will be informal. Both of these events will require planning and participation, so if you'd like to be involved in any way please let me know. And if you read something in the Mission and Ministry Plan that excites you, please share that with me as well. My prayer is that we will have active participation in all of our new ventures. These, and other planned events present us with opportunities for welcoming others into our space. I have every confidence that we will do this with the usual St. Matthew's warm hospitality.

It is impossible for me to express my gratitude to every parishioner by name. That being said, please know that each of you is appreciated and valued for all the ways you contribute to the enriching of our church family. God has surely blessed St. Matthew's in countless ways, and we pray that in this coming year we may come to know God's blessings in new and exciting ways.



Mission & Ministry Plan for St. Matthew's Church, 2018



In response to Bishop Linda Nicholls' request that every Parish/Regional Ministry create a Mission and Ministry Plan for the period 2018-2022, our St. Matthew's community has done the work of setting concrete goals, based on the guidelines of our Bishop. These goals are intended to resonate with our Mission Statement ("We are called to share God's love as we welcome and care for our community"), while keeping us mindful of the Five Marks of Mission. Those five marks are:

- 1. **Evangelism**: proclaiming the good news of the kingdom
- 2. **Discipling**: teaching, baptizing and nurturing new believers
- 3. **Service**: responding to human need by loving service
- 4. **Transforming Society**: transforming unjust structures of society, challenging violence of every kind, pursuing peace and reconciliation
- 5. Safeguarding and Renewing the Earth

Mission & Ministry Plan for St. Matthew's Church, 2018

We thank our Churchwardens, Members of Parish Council, and parishioners who have contributed to the completion of this document. The following pages articulate ways that we commit ourselves to moving forward in faith, as we seek to grow in our understanding of God's call to us as members of God's "beloved community" – the Body of Christ.

Evangelism

In 2018 we will offer the following evangelism activities at St. Matthew's:

2

- Lent/Spring, video series "Thy Kingdom Come."
 This series is designed to reach current St.
 Matthew's parishioners, family and friends.
- Fall of 2018, intergenerational church (aka "Messy Church") to be offered once per month. All are welcome to participate, with special focus on inviting young families in the immediate South Windsor neighbourhood.
- 2018, development of informal evening service structured around: a simple meal; faith sharing; alternate music; teaching; group interaction. Our hope is to involve those who find Sunday morning attendance challenging. Invitation to St. James', Roseland to participate.

- In 2018, Parish Council will identify building conditions that will need to be addressed within the next 5-10 years.
- We will develop (with the help of trade or professional help) budget costs and timelines for any major property work that include a 20% contingency allowance.
- We have been mindful that there are various forms of accessibility needs (i.e. visual, by improved lighting and large print bulletins).
 Although we are wheelchair accessible, we will continue to assess all our accessibility needs.

Finance

- In 2018 we will continue to prepare balanced operating budgets, including the full payment of apportionment and clergy costs.
- St. Matthew's has not had a history of having a capital contingency fund. Our goal in 2018 is to create such a fund, as well as develop a strategy for effective short and long-term investing.
- Leadership will begin the work of addressing trends of financial giving (including data about projected contributions and expenses over the next five years). Information to be shared through newsletters and "town hall" format.

Congregational Health

- We continue to maintain up-to-date records of Safe Church Compliance, including police clearances.
 Rev'd Cathy MacKendrick is coordinator.
- In 2018 we will make Safe Church Policies & Procedures more visible on a regular basis by posting items on bulletin boards and sharing information through newsletter.
- We will continue to make decisions based on broadbased decision making. We have done so in the past by holding special vestry meetings for decisions which impact the life of the community.
- We will continue to offer times of fellowship and fun, both for our current members as well as friends and neighbours. Examples include: after- church fellowship; Talent Night; Games Night; Christmas dessert party.
- Our priority is to have conversations in person or by telephone, with decision-making taking place through personal meetings.

Buildings

 Recent completion of the Property Matrix shows that our building and property are in need of attention, the flat roof being our immediate concern.

Discipleship

In 2018, we will continue the current practice of providing baptismal preparation for those interested (performed by the Rector). This includes an invitation to participate in the worshipping life of the community before determining a date for baptism. In addition,

- Lenten Series, we will make use of the diocesan resource, "Meeting Jesus in the Gospel of John" by holding weekly group conversations throughout Lent, 2018 (following 10 am Sunday worship).
- **Bible study**, based on recent survey of parishioners, periodic bible study series (i.e. 4-6 week units) will be offered, beginning in Fall of 2018.

Service

St. Matthew's has a long history of responding to human need by loving service. We are pleased that **30-35%** of parishioners participate personally in our outreach programs: Marlborough School Breakfast; Christmas Angel Tree (gifts for families of prisoners); Children's Aid Society Christmas Gift Program; Southwest Detention Centre (sewing instruction; preparation of backpacks with personal care items for inmates being released "to the streets"); on-site food cupboard with delivery to four local agencies; collection of items for Hiatus House; Canterbury

College Welcome hampers for incoming students; soup lunches in support of Council of the North & PWRDF; participation in deanery-wide "Operation Point North"; twice monthly services of worship to the Huron Lodge community. We continue to monitor our outreach ministries, under the leadership of our Deacon, the Rev'd Cathy MacKendrick.

Transforming Society

In 2018, we will continue to look for ways of participating in educational Deanery events. By coordinating with the Diocesan Bridgebuilders Group, we will host a "Blanket Exercise" in 2018 at St. Matthew's to help bring awareness to the UN Declaration of Indigenous Peoples. Our contact to the Primate's World Relief and Development Fund is Jennifer McAlpine.

Safeguarding and Renewing the Earth

In recent years we have considered ways of decreasing our use of electricity and water and caring for the environment by: switching to LED lighting in worship space and parish hall; reducing use of Styrofoam; recycling/composting; lights and A/C on timers; team of volunteer landscapers; volunteer picking up discarded trash on church property. We will continue to look for opportunities to build on the

work that has been done in the past, of caring for our environment.

Ministry and Leadership

- We will continue the current practice of holding monthly meetings of Parish Council (excluding summer months) with at least 3 days notice given.
- Parish Council meetings to continue to include time for devotion/prayer and/or educational component, often including member participation.
- Effective communication will continue through current practice of sharing information through Sunday bulletins, newsletters, email communications, Facebook, church website, verbal announcements.
- The Churchwardens and Rector will serve as the Nominating Committee for officers, with input from parishioners.
- We will continue to participate in the life of the Deanery and Diocese. This includes Deanery services and educational events as well as lending our support to Canterbury College and the Bishop's Friends gathering.
- Current leadership has expressed interest in participating in training for Wardens and/or Treasurers. (We have attended deanery-sponsored programs in the past.)

The two groupings that form the basis of funding to support our operating costs are the General Fund and the Apportionment Fund. At the 2017 Vestry, I communicated that because of various factors, and based on the trend in donations to those funds at that time, we were going to fall short in those two areas in 2017.

A call was put forth at that Vestry - if each donating person/family could increase their donations by \$10 per month, we would be able to match our 2016 donations to the General/Apportionment funds and at least have a fighting chance to meet our expenses.

You heard that call, and over the course of the year, we managed to increase our donations by almost 1% to General/Apportionment for the 2017 year.

We have many parishioners who are signed up for auto-donation through the Diocese, either by Credit Card or through an automatic bank withdrawal. It has been proven that churches with a high percentage of auto-donation are the most fiscally sound. I would like to encourage anyone who is considering auto-donations to please see me to discuss it. We are currently at approx. 43% of auto-donations.

There is a cost that the church must pay when processing credit card deductions - this amounts to approx. \$750/year. If anyone is willing to switch from a credit card deduction to an automatic withdrawal from your bank account, please see me - I'll need either a void cheque or bank declaration form with the full information about your account number, but otherwise the switch is very easy.
