Reflection of the Week

Sunday, July 7, 2024

The miracle God hopes for us, is faith. This is God's ardent hope for all of us, is faith. In today's Gospel, it is said that Jesus could not do any miracles except to heal a few disabled people and that Jesus lacked effectiveness. How surprising. A bit curious, isn't it? We can ask ourselves the question; what "miracle" was Jesus hoping to do that he couldn't do? So, the great miracle that Jesus so wanted to do in this page of the Gospel is to awaken the people gathered together to a greater, more complete faith. People were wondering where did that come from? What is this wisdom that was given to him? And how are such miracles done by his hands? For the people of Nazareth, only God could do such a great thing with her. He could not understand that Jesus was the one through whom God acted and accomplished great things. Are we also sometimes like the people of Nazareth to doubt everything that Jesus can do in our lives? Do we still hope for miracles that could not come from someone even greater and more powerful? However, Christ, Jesus, is present in our lives. The Spirit of God acts in our world and gives us the wisdom and intelligence to transform our world to make God's Love known. What do we need for our Faith to be greater? How can we manifest our Faith and how can we let God act and work miracles in our lives?
