# A Message from Our Rector

With the arrival of Easter, comes the most significant and joyous season of the church year: The Great Fifty Days of Easter. What exactly do we celebrate in these fifty days? Nothing less than the miraculous raising from the dead of Jesus of Nazareth. In a word, "resurrection".

Most of us have been touched by the death of someone dear to us. After our loved ones die, we are left with various precious memories. These memories can help to provide comfort, and in a way, we can even claim that the departed "continue to live" through these memories. In the final analysis, however, our experiences of the departed do not venture beyond the realm of memory.

Easter, on the other hand, presents us with a story which describes an entirely different scenario: the followers of Jesus aren't left with mere memories of their beloved teacher and friend; they are now brought face to face with the actual person who they had watched die a gruesome and horrible death... but who has now been raised from the dead. Some of the most beautiful and powerful stories ever written are those in the New Testament that describe what these face to face encounters with the resurrected Jesus were like. They were like nothing that anyone had ever experienced up to that time!

And so, whenever we speak of resurrection, our starting point must always be the unfathomable power of God to accomplish the truly unbelievable! Resurrection represents life that goes beyond our wildest imaginings of what life consists of. Resurrection represents life that breaks through all the human limitations and boundaries imposed by death. Finally, resurrection is the power that transcends memories, and offers us instead, the promise of an experience of life that is fuller, richer and endless. Jesus is the one who has led the way into this new way of living, and it is Jesus who invites us – day by day – to participate in this new and dynamic risen life with him.

In these 50 days of Easter, my hope is that you will be given a taste of "life that goes beyond our wildest imaginings". I pray that Christ's risen, boundary-shattering life will be yours to savor and to share with joy wherever you may be.

Alleluia! Christ is risen.

### From Our Parish Council Notes from March 21

Your wardens Janet Williams and Gordon Drake are very pleased to be able to continue serving the Parish church of St. Matthew for a second year. As in the past, we have put together a summary of Parish events since the beginning of 2018.

Roof: You will recall that the heavy rains and floods of last September brought to the fore the need for a new roof to cover the Narthex and the north side of the church. We are pleased to say that our loan request from the Diocese loan fund has been approved in the amount of \$65,000 (the amount to supplement other funds already raised), so the path is clear to begin work. A fresh round of quotes will be requested, with work to begin in early spring. Many thanks to those who have already contributed to the Build the Roof fund, and to the fund-raising committee of Jane Patterson, Mary Grace Weir, and Janis Fantinic for their energy and enthusiasm. You may find donation envelopes for our Roof Fund in the narthex, and stay tuned for more fundraising initiatives. The goal is achievable, and when done, it will assure the continued viability of St. Matthew's Church for many years to come.

Finances: January was a bad month for the Parish finances because of high costs for snow removal (\$2214), and lower-than-average attendance. However, as of March 4, we are now within \$30 of I where we were last year for donations. There has been a very positive response to Beth Felet's request for people to change their auto-deductions from credit card to chequing, which lowers our costs to the diocese; please contact her if you would like to make the switch. The pancake supper on February 13 was a great success with an attendance of 171, and a net profit of approximately \$1000. Many thanks to John Rossi for organizing the event and our parishioners for their continued support and generosity.

**Property:** In January, we had a major problem with the furnace boiler, leaving the church with no heat. A bearing was gone on a pump motor and may have to be replaced. Many thanks to Onorio Felet for his continuing work to maintain the church property, and make sure that everything is working as it should. If you wish to join the maintenance team, please speak with Onorio.

Outreach: At the suggestion of a local realtor, Terry Zhang, we are embarking on a new initiative to provide English language classes to the large number of recent immigrants in our area, especially families from China who bring their children to attend school at Massey Seconday School. Rev'd. Andreas has put together a grant application to the Diocese for audiovisual equipment to supplement this program. Please contact Rev'd Andreas if you would like to volunteer. This could be an important evangelical opportunity to reach out to our community. For more outreach news, please read our deacon Cathy's column, on page 6.

As I write this, the news of the day features a "Twitter War" between a former U.S. Vice-President and the current President. Sadly, the exchanges contain language which is demeaning and taunting, serving no constructive purpose. This is just one example of many, many others. But the Christian community has been called to behave in ways that are respectful, kind, and life-affirming, and we are to remind one another of this calling whenever we are tempted to stray into ways of behaving that fall short of this goal.

Our Diocese of Huron has developed a "Safe Church" policy which is designed to ensure that every single person be treated with dignity and respect. "Safe Church" provides us with guidance in creating environments where all God's children feel safe: safe from physical or sexual harm; safe from personal or online bullying; safe from gossip or ridicule.

# Our Anglican World



Marilyn Jennings (ObJN) and her husband, Dick, attend our 8:30 Sunday services. In conversation with Marilyn, I learned that she belongs to a religious order, and it occurred to me that others would be interested in hearing about this aspect of her life. I recently had the opportunity to ask Marilyn some questions:

**Andreas Thiel:** When did you become associated with the **Order of Julian of Norwich**, and what made you decide to become an Oblate with this Order?

Marilyn Jennings: I became interested in our Order back in 1985. I belonged to an Episcopal Special interest group and there was an article written by an Episcopal priest saying that a new religious order was being formed based on the writing of Julian of Norwich, who lived in the 1300s (at the same time as Chaucer). It was based on her revelations of God's infinite unconditional love. This was just what I was looking for as I had a profound religious experience in 1981 and was looking for some kind of affiliation. For me, it was a perfect fit. There are several ways of becoming affiliated with the Order. Being an Oblate in the Order of Julian of Norwich is being a part of a family consisting of monks, nuns, Oblates, Associates and Friends of Julian. All affiliates of our Order keep the same four-fold pattern of Rule but scaled for each degree so as to relate to the lifestyle of the individual affiliate.

AT: Who was Julian of Norwich and what do you especially appreciate about her life?

MJ: Dame Julian lived in Norwich, England in the 14th and early 15th century and spent much of her life as an anchorite, a vowed religious living by herself in a small room, called an anchorhold, attached to the parish church of St. Julian in Norwich. What is known about her is her remarkable book, the Revelation of Divine Love, an account of and the fruit of twenty years' reflection on a series of visions which revealed to Julian the depths of God's unconditional love for us in Jesus Christ. I appreciate her life as I understand and can relate to it.

AT: Are there opportunities for "ordinary" lay folk to get involved with the Order and, if so, how?

**MJ:** Being an affiliate of our Order is truly meant for "ordinary" lay folk. The "even-Christians" (us regular folk) for whom Julian wrote her book are to be encouraged to learn as much as they can from such treasures, and to understand that being in the presence of Jesus is the teacher of us all. The Order of Julian remains by definition a contemplative order. **AT:** What are you personally thankful for, in your ongoing journey as an Oblate in the Order of Julian of Norwich?

MJ: An Oblate life is a very particular way of saying "yes" to God. It is a way of life that develops the expression specifically for the goal of Christ-likeness and for the sake of the Church and the world. In our affiliation, it is a yes to being a dwelling for God and being committed to keeping our hearts clear of whatever that does not serve the Yes that is Christ Jesus. Like many commitments, it can make life a long series of Yeses. Some yeses are painful and some easy, but in them all are the treasures of peace and joy. Neither wealth, nor specific vocations, nor long training is needed. A yes to God, even in the secret of the heart, can open unforeseen doors and bear unimagined fruit.

#### **World Day of Prayer**

It is always a challenge to have a committee plan an event. However, with preplanning with Mary Grace we were able to have only one ecumenical planning meeting, assigning roles to the various churches. Clergy generally attend but do not take a major role in the service. We were particularly delighted to have children in the Sunday school making votive lanterns for table decorations and having their own awareness of the theme of the service the Sunday before. It is always delightful at St. Matthew's, to know that we have very competent and gifted folks to invite to assist in this big venture: sidespeople, collection supervisors, and those artistic and gracious folks who received the other churches food donations and prepared the luncheon space and served the tea and coffee and the punch, which was a great hit (see p. 7). Together we warmly welcomed other Christians from Roman Catholic, Baptist, United churches, Salvation Army, Presbyterian, and other Anglican churches into our space. A great success, and thanks to all.

### Ask the Rector

A regular column in which you get to ask whatever is on your mind. (All submissions will be considered anonymous.)

- Q: After singing the first hymn at the beginning of our communion service, the priest says the Collect of the Day by himself. Why doesn't the congregation join in?
- A. The reason is found in our prayer book (BAS), where you'll see various instructions printed in red ink. Some of these instructions contain the word "may" (indicating some flexibility in the rule), while others don't. The instructions for the Collect of the Day read: "The community may pray in silence" followed by "The celebrant... says the Collect". In this brief liturgical act, the following takes place: the optional silence allows the gathered assembly to put aside all distracting thoughts, and prepare to offer themselves in worship. It can be thought of as a mental "shifting of gears". After this shift, and into this silence, the presider offers a prayer on behalf of the community. This is not a time for us to try to match the pace of our recitation with others or with the presider. Rather, it's an opportunity for us to become still and attuned to the content of the prayer. The Collect of the Day serves as a way for us to "collect our thoughts" while allowing our individual prayers and intentions to be "collected" into the prayer of the Church.

During his homily, Rev'd Andreas pointed out that there is always a sharp contrast between the festive procession that begins in the parish hall, and the somber readings that follow, relating the Passion of Our Lord; he compared this contrast with life itself, remarking that short times of rejoicing must be appreciated because, without doubt, there will also be moments of pain or sadness. Our rector explained that today's Gospel according to Mark, answers the question "Who Will Declare Jesus Guilty?" pointing to the crowd, that mass of humanity that ultimately includes us, and everyone from every time and place on earth. Rev'd Andreas concluded with the simple, yet important, truth that throughout the Passion, Jesus did trust in God, so with our lives, we can too.

The contributions by many others from both parishes are greatly appreciated. All costs were covered, and the rest of the funds raised were shared with St. lames. An additional and very generous donation to St. Matthew's from Dr. Sushil Jain (Research Fellow Canterbury College) and his wife Christine, resulted in a grand total of \$1091.00 for our parish. The success of this event augurs well for other similar joint projects between St. Matthew's and St. James' Churches.


On February 2, during the monthly gathering of the TNT crowd, a birthday celebration for Ann Hucal took place (her birthday is Feb 1st.)


