A Message from Our Rector

The Pluses and Minuses of Social Media

Most people, these days, have some involvement with the online world of social media. Our manner of interacting with one another has been revolutionized over the past several years, thanks to platforms such as Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, Snapchat, etc. They have proven to be helpful in many ways, and in other ways, not so helpful. I recently spoke with a colleague who informed me that he was closing down his Facebook account. For him, what had started as an enjoyable way of keeping in touch with friends and family had turned into something that felt a little more sinister. He began to notice that he was growing increasingly upset or troubled by the content of some of the online messages he read. This experience was causing him ongoing stress. Once he terminated his Facebook account, he felt a palpable sense of relief. My colleague certainly isn't the only person who has evaluated the "pluses and minuses" of the world of social media, and I appreciate his concerns. However, every so often, Facebook features a message or article that provides me with something educational or edifying. For example, a few weeks ago, Facebook showed me an item that I had posted way back in 2012. I had long since forgotten it, and after reflecting on the message, I was extremely glad that Facebook had the presence of mind (!) to bring it to my attention six years later. I shared it with our Parish Council in September, and based on the conversation which ensued, they appreciated it as well. The post comes in the form of a simple question, and interestingly enough, it is an appropriate question for us to consider in this Thanksgiving season:

"What if you woke up today with only the things you thanked God for yesterday?" Now, didn't that get your attention?

Thank you, St. Matthew's family, for being who you are, and doing what you do, and for growing in your understanding of what it means to be people who are called to "share God's love as we welcome and care for our community." Thank you for being more than a virtual community.

From Our Parish Council

Notes from the Sept 19 2018 council meeting

Welcome to fall, 2018 at St. Matthew's! We hope you had a good summer. Your wardens, Janet Williams and Gordon Drake, are pleased to present the following summary of recent events, as recorded by the Parish Council:

Roof: We are pleased to say that the repair work is now complete, thanks to a loan from the Diocese of Huron. The original loan was \$65,000, but we repaid \$20,000 just a few weeks later. The net amount owed on June 30 was \$45,000. We have made 4 payments to date (June, July, August and September). The goal of paying back the loan in short order is achievable, **now is the time to contribute** as much as we are able, to avoid future interest charges. Thank you for your continuing support.

Finances: Because of the roof repairs, our expenses have exceeded income, resulting in a net loss of \$68,548. This was partly covered by the roof loan (which is not income since we still have to repay!), together with further donations, leaving a net **operating deficit of \$12,227**. We are grateful to all our parishioners for their continued generosity in support of the work of St. Matthew's, and trust that we will balance our finances by the end of the calendar year. In addition, we earned \$800 from the use of our hall in the recent Ontario election, and it is scheduled to be used again for the upcoming federal election.

Property: Thanks to the work of Onorio Felet, we now have a new door for the Church Hall at a cost of \$1,434 (including HST). Onorio and John Rossi arranged for grass-cutting services for the summer. We are still in need of a contractor to handle snow removal for the winter. Many thanks to Onorio for his continuing work to maintain the church property, and make sure that everything is working as it should.

Outreach: Our Rector Andreas Thiel reported a successful bid for a Jubilee grant of \$3,000 from the Diocese. The grant is in support of the highly successful English as a Second Language (ESL) classes for recent immigrants to our neighbourhood (class of 2018 with their certificates, photo right), with attendance growing each week. It currently stands at around 30 participants. Most significantly, the classes have now been supplemented by Bible studies after each class, filled with enthusiastic participants. Jennifer McAlpine and Gordon Drake made the successful pitch to the Diocese for the grant. The original suggestion for the language programme came from our local



realtor Terry Zhang. On a second front, Rev'd. Andreas is continuing an extension of his ministry to include the role of Chaplain at Huron Lodge, involving a time commitment of 10 hours per week; The Parish Council continues to be strongly supportive of this initiative.

Finally, Rev'd Andreas is launching a new programme of "Casual Worship" with the first two services scheduled for Friday, October 19, and Friday, November 30. These are intended to be a form of intergenerational, informal worship, beginning with a complimentary pizza supper, and followed by a devotional service. (See ad on next page.)

For this Thanksgiving season, let us give thanks to God for our many blessings.

As Rev'd. Andreas has asked us to ponder:

"What if today, we only had those things for which we thanked God yesterday?"

Everybody is welcome to attend our meetings, usually on the **third** Wednesday of the month, starting at 7:30 PM, in the choir room.

Our Anglican World

177th Synod of the Diocese of Huron May 27-29 2018 London, Ontario

Report by our deacon, the Rev'd Cathy MacKendrick

Bishop Linda led Synod efficiently and graciously. "Rebuild the Church, O Lord,
And let it begin with me. Amen"

I found this Synod rather tame in respect to various people hotly discussing about issues. However, the upcoming General Synod of the Canadian Church next summer 2019 will be the second reading of the change of the Marriage Canon in which the words man and woman will be replaced by "the parties to the marriage". It passed in 2016 and if passed the second time the Anglican Church of Canada will accept same-sex couples for legal marriage in their churches. Both Bishop Linda and Archbishop Fred Hiltz addressed the canon and its ramifications – either way – for two sessions of our Synod. If the General Synod should vote to change the marriage canon for the National Church, the Conscience Clause would be in effect. The Conscience Clause permits Diocesan Bishops to opt out for reasons of conscience

for their Diocese. It has been used before when the ordination canon was changed to include women for ordination. Bishop Linda spoke honestly and fairly about the importance of listening to both sides on this issue and that no matter the outcome, there will be pain. There will be a need for courtesy and tolerance by everyone. She pointed out that other Anglican Communions around the world are watching the Canadian Church to see how we handle this issue.

Two things that I took away from her were these words:

Our unity is in Christ not in our sameness.

We should demonstrate that we are willing to stay at the Table even in our differences. I encourage you to get on the Diocese of Huron's website (address, next page), and view the taped discussions at Synod and make note of the resources that are available to everyone to examine.

I remember the first night in the Cathedral, with the wonderful music of the organ and all the voices both in the choir and audience. The place was full and we almost melted as it was over 100 degree inside. Afterwards, we were very glad to go outside for a delicious BBQ, and especially grateful to enjoy a cooler breeze.

The next day at the conference, it was the other extreme, and we almost froze. Bishop Linda addressed us in the morning; she is a wonderful speaker. The theme of this year's Huron Synod was "Being Disciples: Abiding in God's Word"; the rest of the day was devoted to all kinds of reports, including some presentations by lay delegates who shared their own experience of being Christ's disciples.

It was overall a wonderful experience, and a great opportunity to listen and learn from our clergy, from Archbishop Fred Hiltz to Bishop Linda and Bishop Terry Dance, and also from clergy and lay delegates from other regions in our Diocese.

What a great beginning to St. Matthew's outreach ministry.

A load of food stuffs went to the Welcome Centre for homeless women and children in the west end this summer. Backpacks and coloured pencils were donated. We are set for this next year with backpacks for homeless released inmates (see photo). Mark, the volunteer co-ordinator at the Detention Centre, was delighted with the gym bag + a large grocery bag full of boxes of coloured pencils for the inmates. The sewing programme is up and running with six teachers from St. Matthew's, St. Stephen's Oldcastle and Church of the Epiphany, Kingsville. Trunk loads of items go to Hiatus House on a regular basis thanks to Pauline and Don Patterson.



Our need for Marlborough Breakfast Programme is ongoing. The average cost of a hot breakfast is between \$41 and \$45 depending on the cost of fruit. We have eight teams this year with 4 new cooks and I new muffin maker. This is wonderful for participation in our ministry to the hungry. A big thankyou to those of you who have contributed to our collection in September. For those of us, myself included, who want to add to our balance, we will continue to accept your donation. Put it in an envelope and mark it Marlborough Breakfast and we will use it to feed the kids.

This fall we will be collecting food items for Windsor Homes Coalition for their food bank and particularly their Christmas boxes for their clients. Each box is geared to the number of folks in each of their homes and are hand delivered to them by staff and volunteers in the week before Christmas.

What a delight it is to be a member of a church community that does such active and varied ministry as the Body of Christ in the world. We are truly blessed.

Stained Glass Dedication By Doug Warford

The beautiful stained glass in the narthex (photo, right) was designed and donated by my sister, Mary Warford. Mary was gifted in her use of stained glass, and created many memorable pieces that are absolutely beautiful in their colours and patterns. She took up stained glass originally as a hobby and worked on it in her small apartment in London, Ontario. She quickly discovered that she had a talent for it. In the beginning, she was very productive at creating different works (see other examples, below.) Many apartments in her buildings still have pieces of her art hanging on the walls. Her aim was to open a small business to work on her stained glass. As time progressed, she became physically less able to cut the glass, especially the small pieces required for certain patterns, which are very difficult to cut. Eventually she had to discontinue her work as cancer never allowed her to continue.

Despite many difficulties in her life, she gave warmly and freely to others while maintaining a strong individuality. Her giving spirit was especially evident every Christmas when she alone hosted and prepared Christmas Dinner for her family in her small apartment – all fourteen of us! What warm and wonderful times we would have. I am honoured that a piece of her work hangs to the glory of God in St. Matthew's.

On July 8, 2018, during our 10 am service, Mary's precious donation was formally dedicated by our rector, the Rev'd Andreas Thiel, with the following prayer:

"We give you thanks, O God, as we dedicate this stained glass creation to your glory and praise. We thank you for having blessed Mary Warford with gifts of artistry, and for giving her the desire to craft this object of beauty. Grant those who look upon it, faith to know your gracious purpose in all things, give us joy in them, and lead us to the building up of your kingdom; through your Son, Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever ... 

Greetings from the Savva family from Reykjavík, Iceland! The Lutheran church of Hallgrímur was consecrated in 1986; at 74.5m (244 ft), it is one of the tallest structures in the country. The statue of explorer Leif Erikson (1930) in front of the church commemorates the 1000th anniversary of Iceland's parliament at Þingvellir (930 AD). The church houses an impressive pipe organ built by Johannes Klais of Bonn, Germany.

May the practice of gratefulness continue to accompany us all into a fulfilling season called 'Extraordinary'!




