A Message from Our Rector

A Trip Like No Other

October brings with it a short "season of Thanksgiving" (Harvest Thanksgiving on October 6; National Thanksgiving the following Sunday). In our Thanksgiving observance, we can't help noting that in this twenty-first century, far too many people around the world continue to face a daily existence of great difficulty. Wars, famines, poverty, drug addiction, natural or human-made disasters. The list is a lengthy one.

In November, I will be travelling to a region in the Middle East that has had its share of troubles for a very long time. Earlier this year I learned that I was selected to represent the Primate's World Relief & Development Fund on a delegation to Israel/Palestine. The IO person delegation will be travelling under the guidance of KAIROS Canada, an ecumenical organization that has been actively involved in seeking peace, justice and sustainability in the Middle East. The mission of KAIROS is very much in accord with that of PWRDF, and my hope is that I will be bringing back with me some insights that can be helpful in developing future PWRDF programs. Members of the delegation will also be asked to meet with government officials, with the aim of guiding future policies. Among other areas, the delegation will focus on an advocacy strategy that raises awareness about the impacts of conflict on women and girls.

I'm pleased to report that I've already received financial support from our diocese, as well as a parish in our deanery. I'm well on my way to raising the necessary \$5,000.00. If you would like to add your support, there are special offering envelopes placed on the table in the Narthex, clearly marked for the KAIROS trip. There will be much reading and learning to do in preparation for this important trip. I'd like to invite you to accompany me in this period of preparation, and would be pleased to answer any questions you might have. In the next few weeks we'll have an opportunity to watch a documentary titled "On the Side of the Road." This film explores the complexities involved in the relationship between Israeli and Palestinian individuals and communities. It will help to provide us with a better understanding of the challenges that millions of people in that part of the world face daily.

Please join me in praying for the upcoming KAIROS delegation, for peace in Palestine/Israel, and for conditions that will allow all people of that land to one day celebrate a peace-filled season of Thanksgiving of their own.

From Our Parish Council

Notes from the Sept 18 2019 council meeting

Greetings from your Wardens, Janet Williams and Gordon Drake. Hope you had a great summer! We are pleased to present the following summary of recent events, as recorded by the Parish Council:

Concerts: Our recent Blue-Grass concert organized jointly with St. James' on September 15 was another great success in our concert series. Thanks to Bill Wilkinson at St. James', we featured a prize-winning group of six musicians. The group called **Winterline** was voted the CCBS best instrumental group for 2018. Thanks to all those who helped to advertise and sell tickets (see page 4 for more.) Thanks also to Mary Lou Drake and her many helpers for organizing the coffee following the concert, and cakes from St. James'. The attendance was 139, and raised \$960 (after expenses) going towards the roof fund. This brings the total to \$2460 from our two concerts this year. For future events, another Windsor Symphony Strings concert is in the planning stages for next spring.

Finances: We are pleased to report strong financial results for the summer months. As of the end of August, our General plus Apportionment funds stood at \$91,337, up 5% from this time last year. In addition, Mary Lou Drake's Tea in July raised \$970, and Andreas' heroic Hymn Book Play-a-thon on June 8 resulted in \$6036. Our apportionment is paid in full (not many parishes can say that). Thanks to Beth Felet for her very able work as envelope secretary, and to Jane Patterson for her very able accounting skills. We are grateful to all our parishioners for their continued generosity in support of the work of St. Matthew's.

Property: Repairs to the potholes in the parking lot have turned out to be a knotty problem. Onorio Felet has contacted several paving companies to get quotes to do the work, but none has yet responded. On the brighter side, Ted Felet has very generously devoted his time to install our new WiFi system, which is now available throughout the church. The total cost is around a modest \$600. Many thanks to Ted for his work on this. Richard Hucal's work to renovate the bathrooms is proceeding swiftly and is nearing completion (photo, right.)

Outreach: Rev'd Cathy continues with her highly valued program of backpacks for the Windsor Detention Centre. This ministry continues to need your support in order to cover its costs. The Marlborough Breakfast Program has completed another very successful year of making sandwiches and muffins for the children, and is setting up for the coming year. Rev'd Glenda continues to provide a pastoral presence to "Feeding Windsor," and to the LGBTQ community.

PWRDF Representation: Our Rector Andreas Thiel has the honour of being chosen to serve as a representative for the Primate's World Relief and Development Fund (PWRDF) of Canada to travel to Palestine and Israel. The purpose of the trip is to serve as an advocate for Palestinians with the aim of creating conditions where they can live and work in peaceful conditions. Those who wish to support Andreas in this initiative are invited to contribute toward his travel costs, which are not covered by the PWRDF.

Through our work, in many ways we strive to realize the Biblical passage: "God has called us through the gospel so that we may obtain the glory of our Lord Jesus Christ" Thessalonians 2.14

Everybody is welcome to attend our meetings, usually on the **third** Wednesday of the month, starting at 7:30 PM, in the choir room.

On Friday June 7 at 8:00 PM, our rector, the Rev'd Andreas Thiel, began attempting the unimaginable! He had pledged to play all 665 hymns in our hymn book. Before 10:00 PM that night, he had passed the hymn #100 mark (cheerful attendants from the congregation may be seen acknowledging the fact).



The next morning, Rev'd Andreas was back, skillfully performing hymns, including a few on the piano. A spread of coffee, tea and sweets was offered throughout the day, including a generous supply of Timbits, courtesy of our friendly neighbourhood Tim Hortons on Grand Marais Street. A member of the press was there to cover the event for **Snapd Windsor** (https://windsor.snapd.com/events/view/1257147)











Lunch break came with sandwiches and refreshments by hymn #323; there were also door prizes, and our Craft Guild was in session, so our rector was not alone for a single second for the entire duration of the play-a-thon.

A supportive audience, enthusiastic volunteers, Rev'd Andreas' heroic performance of twelve hours in total to cover all 665 hymns, and a grand total of \$6036.00 in pledges, all added up to another successful event at St. Matthew's!



Ask the Rector

A column in which you get to ask whatever is on your mind. (All submissions will be considered anonymous.)

Q: What's the difference between the words 'Episcopal' and 'Anglican'?

A: The best place to start is by looking at the meaning of those two terms. 'Episcopal' is an adjective derived from the Greek word episcopus (overseer, or bishop). So, to say that you belong to an episcopal church means simply that your church has its governance structured around the authority of a bishop. The Anglican Church of Canada is an episcopal church for this very reason. (You could say that the Lutheran Church is also an episcopal church, although for Lutherans, the role of a bishop is slightly different from our Anglican understanding.) Once you capitalize the word 'episcopal', you're actually referring to the religious body in the United States, known collectively as 'The Episcopal Church' (TEC). As with the Anglican Church, TEC has dioceses and deaneries (and yes, bishops!) The liturgies of the two churches are very similar, but strictly speaking, Episcopalians are not Anglicans, the reason being that the word 'Anglican' comes from the Medieval Latin word anglicanus (which means 'English'). Bottom line: All Anglicans are 'episcopal' but Episcopalians are not 'Anglican'.

Confused yet? Welcome to the church!

Angel Tree Christmas: Prison Fellowship Canada

For several years individuals from the family of St. Matthew have participated in this programme. It is a very rewarding endeavor but not always the easiest to accomplish. These families often have difficulty trusting outsiders. The children's caregivers do not always know that the inmate has signed the children up for a gift. It takes some extra time and patience to complete a direct gift. But there are distance gifts which require phone calls etc. In any case it is rewarding to keep children and their parents connected at the time of year that media etc. say families should be together. How It Works: In prisons and jails across Canada, prisoners apply to Angel Tree for their children to receive a gift at Christmas. They also write a personal gift tag to the child to be included with the gift. The steps are:

- 1. Churches, organizations, and individuals register to become sponsors.
- 2. Sponsors contact the caregivers to confirm the gift suggestion and coordinate a delivery time. Sponsors purchase, wrap, and deliver the gift directly to the child or caregiver in time for Christmas.


Cost: The cost of Angel Tree Christmas is a **maximum of \$35 per child**. Included with the children's information, PFC will provide a suggested gift idea directly from the parent.



A Note from Glenda



This being my first 'formal' contribution to our St. Matthew's newsletter, I thought I would share a bit about 'me'.

I was born and raised in Alberta (Calgary) and migrated to Ontario in 1970 to attend the University of Windsor where I subsequently completed my undergraduate degree in Social Work. After a number of years of working in the Niagara region and in London, Ontario, initially with the Ministry of Community and Social Services, followed by hospital pediatric and child protection work, I returned to the University of Windsor to complete a Master of Social Work Degree. Subsequently, I was offered a position with Windsor Regional Hospital where I spent the better part of my social work career (44 years) as a clinical social work therapist in the Mental Health Clinic – Mood and Anxiety Treatment Program. For the last 3 years of my hospital career, I worked in Supportive Services at the Windsor Regional Hospital Cancer Centre (Metropolitan Campus). In conjunction with these primary positions, I taught as a sessional lecturer in the School of Social Work at the University of Windsor for 22 years. From 1988 – 1993, I also worked in my own Private Clinical Practice and from 1993–2016, in Practice under Caverzan and Fisher Associates.

When I officially retired from clinical hospital work, I began a new journey....one that I had often thought about and which culminated in my being ordained to the 'vocational diaconate' at St. Paul's Cathedral in London on November 28, 2013. A Deacon's ministry is one of 'servanthood', and our primary focus is serving the poor, the disadvantaged and others in need. Accordingly, I engaged in 'out-reach' ministry. Prior to and since ordination, I have served at the Downtown Mission, St. Leonard's House, the Windsor Youth Centre, and have often ministered to those I met while walking the downtown streets. Currently, I am a pastoral presence at Feeding Windsor and I assist and/or conduct Services at Huron Lodge, hosted by St. Matthew's. I make pastoral visits, I serve on the Diocesan Safe Church Committee, and of course, I continue to 'be there' for a few people with whom I have ministered in the past. I am grateful to say that your acceptance of me as a Deacon here at St. Matthew's has also afforded me some wonderful 'in-reach' experiences.

I again wish to acknowledge my gratitude to 'you'. Thank you for inspiring me by your faithful generosity toward those who are less fortunate; thank you for the warmth of your welcome not so many months ago; thank you for your kindness in waiting patiently while I got (and continue to get) the 'hang of things'!

I am so grateful to be here.....to be here with 'you'. I feel that I am 'home'.

Bishop Linda Nicholls' statement on same sex marriage resolution:

Same-sex marriages permitted in Huron as of August 1, 2019

Bishop of Huron released a statement on July 18 authorizing the availability of marriage to same-sex couples starting August 1, 2019 as a pastoral local option under the following guidelines: 1) Same-sex marriages will be permitted in parishes where the priest and the Parish Council have considered this matter and agreed that the parish will do so. 2) Any parish desiring to do so will write a letter to the Bishop requesting permission – signed by the priest (rector/incumbent) and the Wardens and including a description of the consideration taken by the Parish Council. 3) No parish is required to offer same-sex marriage in their location. 4) Clergy already have provision by canon to refuse to perform a marriage for reasons of conscience.

Synod of the Diocese of Huron will elect the 14th Bishop of Huron on October 26

There have been a total of five nominations for the election of the 14th Bishop of Huron to take place at St. Paul's Cathedral in London, Ontario on October 26, 2019. Four of them were proposed by the Diocesan Council: The Venerable Dr. Tim Dobbin, the Very Reverend Paul Millward, The Venerable Tanya Phibbs, and the Reverend Canon Dr. Todd Townshend; the House of Bishops also nominated The Right Reverend Bill Cliff, Bishop of Brandon; further nominations may be included until the deadline of October 16.

On that day, The St. Matthew's clergy, along with Lay Delegate Margaret Kissau, will be in London for the election. The words from BAS pg. 676 provide an appropriate prayer in support of those involved in the process:

"Almighty God, giver of all good gifts, look on your church with grace, and guide the minds of those who shall choose a bishop for this diocese, that we may receive a faithful servant who will care for your people and support us in our ministries; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen."




