A Message From Our Clergy

Comfort & Joy – A Reflection

"Oh that you would tear the heavens asunder and come down to us, O God. Come, be with us.....comfort your people....." Isaiah 64:1 & 40:1

More than ever, the Advent cry from the Prophet Isaiah resonates within our very being.....'we' are the Isaiah of 2020, and our cry is an urgent one. We need *comfort* in the face of a pandemic and all the hardships created by it. We so yearn to feel that special joy "Christmas Joy".....in our hearts. But it may be hard to feel comforted or joyful when we are feeling the weight of social confinement or feeling *un-hugged*. So in the face of 'all', I offer a brief reflection.

I think that it is important to *acknowledge* to oneself that the Christmas season 'will be' different this year. We may not 'like the changes', but if we take charge and think *outside the box*, we *can* create something uniquely meaningful. I think also that one of the greatest gifts we can give ourselves is 'permission' permission to en-'joy' the season to en-'joy' our preparations during Advent. Again, nothing can change the fact that a *lot* has changed over the past number of months..... that we have given up 'a lot' during these times, or are experiencing a deep loss. As difficult as it may be, it is so very important to make a *conscious decision* to give ourselves *permission* to look for, and be in touch with, those parts of our lives that offer a promise of joy. Let's do our best to look beyond the things that might be bringing us down so that we can be ready and waiting and open to seeing what is good and joyful around us.

Yes, *change* during a pandemic is inevitable. But, as the Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, said in recent musings, "What has 'not' changed is the story and the meaning of Jesus' birth. God is with us.....with us in the mess as in the good, in the disappointment and the difficulty, in sorrow and in celebration."

Yes! Throughout these seasons of Advent and Christmas, God 'is' with us. Wishing you the gifts of "comfort and joy". *Glenda+*

Re: Managing the COVID-19 Pandemic

Dear St. Matthew's Parishioners,

We are writing again to thank you for your continued support during these difficult times. We have been able to gather together for worship since September 27, 2020 in small numbers with enhanced precautions to comply with public health standards. The process of pre-registration for Sunday services was cumbersome and time consuming so we have decided to discontinue pre-registration. We will re-evaluate as we proceed. So far, there has not been a problem with excess attendance beyond our restricted capacity of 50, and our parishioners have had no problem sitting in front of the green markers.

As you are probably aware, unfortunately our annual Christmas Craft and Food Market will not be able to proceed this year. However, we have had a small group working diligently and we are pleased to say that our World Famous Meat Pies, otherwise known as tourtière, are available for sale. Please tell your friends and family about them, we have lots of pies available. Large pies are \$15.00, small pies are \$7.00. You can place an order by contacting Sue Trenhaile at suantrenhaile@hotmail.com or 519- 972-6820.

Our finances remain in reasonably good shape, despite the pandemic. For September, our income of \$9988 compares with our expenses of \$14,295 for a loss of **\$4307**. However, September was a difficult month with extraordinary expenses for a report on designated hazardous substances within the church, such as asbestos, as required by the Ontario Occupational Health and Safety Act. On the other hand, our year-to-date figures look better overall. For those figures, our income of \$110,064 was down from the budgeted amount of \$131,349, but the expenses were also down to \$104,713 from the budgeted amount of \$123,127, and so we were left with a small net profit of **\$5360**.

In closing, let us remember the thought for today, as we live through the stresses of the pandemic "I seek you with all my heart; do not let me stray from your commands." Psalm 119:10.

We have in place different ways of staying in contact with one another:



Gathering Again at St. Matthew's

After enduring State of Emergency and Quarantine measures for several months, as imposed by our City, Province and Federal Government, we were finally able to gather once again, for the first time, to celebrate St. Matthew's 65th Anniversary:

This was made possible by the implementation of a long list of modifications in order to keep everybody safe. Services are now limited to 40-45 minutes in length, with at least one hour in between, to allow air circulation and disinfecting time with a fogger. Attendance is limited to a maximum of 50 people. There is mandatory use of masks and sanitizer, as well as no physical contact and safe 2m distancing at the pews, wafers in lieu of bread and wine for our Eucharist, and one-way flow along the side corridors and central aisle.

We will continue observing the safety measures for as long as necessary, adapting to the new challenges of the COVID19 pandemic. Thank you for your cooperation and continuing support.

A Snapshot of Synod 2020 by Carol Caverzan

Presented at St. Matthew's
on Sunday, November, 2020

The 180th Synod of the Diocese of Huron was held on Saturday, September 26, 2020. It was a virtual ZOOM gathering of lay delegates and clergy from 10 am to 3 pm.

This was my first Synod as the lay-delegate for St. Matthew's and I thank you for entrusting me with this role. I had been the lay-delegate for a period of time with my previous church and had attended Synods 'in person' in London. Being in a position to 'compare' the two formats, I must say that while I so appreciated the convenience of participation from my living room, I 'did' miss the 'in person'. Rev. Glenda and I attended Synod together via my laptop, and took turns *brewing tea* during the breaks. It was a very *different* Synod experience, to say the least.

For this morning, I thought I would simply pull from the 2020 Synod those parts that 'really' left my thoughts *percolating* because the presentations were intriguing or new or they challenged current realities.

There was the usual voting on motions such as one to amend the "Constitution of the Diocese of Huron" because it currently does *not* include a provision for an *online, virtual Synod*.

There were several presentations by video. Two that I particularly noted were:

- The **Justice League of Huron** that provided insight into the effect of Climate Change on Refugees, and, **Luke's Place**.....a new way of doing Church, created by the Parish of St. Luke the Evangelist, situated near King's College and the University of Western Ontario.

- The parish is now called **St. Luke's Worshipping Community and Luke's Place London**, a unique ministry of the Diocese of Huron focusing on ministering to college and university students, hosting programs for them in Christian leadership training. Finally, there was Bishop Todd Townshend's Popular Report.

Bishop Todd offered *four areas of focus*... diocesan priorities from 2020 to 2025. His 'Strategic Goal' is that we shift our central focus from *operations* to: *renewal* and *new creation*. His hope is that we become more of a *learning church*, a *just church*, a *diverse church*, a *new church*. He said: "*How we operate, how we function, is very important. However, we can keep this machine running effectively and efficiently... and still fail to fulfil our primary mission. Especially, where circumstances, like a pandemic, have put us in survival mode. We spend over 80%, in some cases, 90% of our energy and resources just on keeping the 'operation' going. And it's getting harder and harder just to operate. Some of this operation was set up under very different circumstances. And what used to work really well, doesn't work now.*" What Bishop Todd was proposing was NOT about 'adding' more on to what we are already doing. Rather, he proposed that we review our current mission and ministries..... let go of some things.....and carefully choose where we invest our time, talent and treasure. Bishop Todd charged Synod with making a real commitment to focus on a new way of 'being church'. In doing so, we need to look to our Ancient attitudes, practices, and habits, and RE-envision them *for a new age*. Bishop Todd's hope is that by next spring or in the fall at the latest, we can commit to some new ways of being; to help us along the way,

Bishop Todd has set a committee to lead us on our journey.

... Cont. A Snapshot of Synod 2020

If you think of it, we at St. Matthew's, have already begun to re-visit and re-envision how we do 'church'... how we do ministry. Our strategic work has only been intensified, clarified, and accelerated by the pandemic. The pandemic has been revelatory. This has been a period of building 'church' *outside* of the church building. Even before the pandemic, Rev. Andreas had already created *Second Wednesday*, whereby a small group gathered monthly to pray, reflect and deepen their spiritual life. *Second Wednesday* is very much in keeping with one of Bishop Todd's Synod comments: "We cannot rely on Sunday morning to do it all!"

THE PLAN

So, Bishop Todd's plan is that we shift the centre of gravity in every congregation of the Diocese of Huron from **operations** to **renewal and new creation** and become:

- (1) **A learning church** – embracing spiritual growth opportunities
- (2) **A just church** - that makes wrongs right, and avoids injustice in the first place
- (3) **A diverse church**- We need to come closer to the diversity of the Anglican Communion as a whole, and closer to the demographic of our neighbourhoods.
- (4) **A new church** - not the kind of "new and improved" product that you'd find for sale in a store. This is the deepest, truest, form of "new" possible.

In Bishop Todd's 'closing remarks' he said: "We are in a time of transformation, and, a certain *dying and rising* will be the "mystery" and 'joyride' of our generation. We are being given an opportunity to be faithful to God, who is faithful to us."

My 'closing remark' is actually a question that I continue to ponder, particularly in terms of what has been "new" for us as a worshipping community in recent months. **"Is how we do church and ministry now simply our human response to the constraints of a pandemic, or, is our response really the work of God, already leading us into something new?"**



Marlborough Breakfast Programme

With the issue of covid-19, the school has had to cancel the breakfast programme for the time being. The school's capacity is about $\frac{3}{4}$ its regular population of students. Neil McCauley, the Vice Principal, and Nikki, the co-ordinator, have created an expanded Nutrition Program for the students. **Each day, each class is given a variety of nutritious snacks to choose from.** When he was a teacher at the school, Neil created an extensive nutrition programme with two nutrition breaks each day. When I spoke with him in September, I asked what we could do. By the end of September, I received a wish list from Nikki.

So we started right away with what we had already donated and with some purchases. A request for muffin bakers went out. Currently there are 19 bakers, 4 delivery people, 2 raisin baggers, and 2 shoppers. Each week, on Tuesday, 144 individually wrapped muffins, cheese snacks, and nutrition bars are gathered. Every other week either 130 bags of raisins or 240 cheese strips go as well.

Please read the letter from Neil (previous page), and note how he addresses the folks. He and the others in the school know and understand that this programme is a ministry of St. Matthew's.

Sometime soon I will go shopping for underwear and socks for the children. When is a safe time for me to do this at Walmart? I find I am nervous being in crowded stores. **Let me know please.**

“Come, you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was naked and you gave me clothing.....when you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me.”

Matthew 25: 34-36;40

South West Detention Centre

Further in this bible passage, the king in the parable also talks about “visiting me in prison”. Our prison ministry has been severely curtailed by the pandemic. No sewing programme right now. However, we can still bring items into the SWDC, such as: backpacks, cards, playing cards, soft covered books, jigsaw puzzles, coloured pencils and crayons.




