SPECIAL VESTRY MEETING

Thursday, October 12, 2023 at 6:30 pm

Important roof update, including a motion to approve the application for a diocesan loan. Archdeacon Jane Humphreys will be in attendance.

Fall greetings, from your Church Wardens, we hope you had an enjoyable and restful summer!

The return of Autumn brings fall cleanup of leaves and all the trappings of summer, as well as new beginnings. We'd like to bring you up to date with what's been happening behind the scenes at St Matthew's.

First of all, the roof loan (from 2018) has now been paid in full, which is the good news. Unfortunately, we continue to be plagued with infiltrating water, and a recent professional inspection confirmed our suspicions that the installation was improperly completed, and that it was "void of proper and industry standard design criteria."

We are now engaged in a frustrating insurance claim, which is being disputed. Please know that the Church is working diligently - on every level - to bring this matter to a favourable conclusion: your Rector, your Wardens, your area Archdeacon, as well as staff at Church House, including those in the Bishop's Office. We are diligently working toward a new flat roof to be installed as soon as possible (See Vestry Meeting, above.)

This 2023 has seen a healthy increase in donated funds. Our expenses continue to run higher than expected, though, resulting in a current accumulated budget deficit of \$17,696.

Sadly, long time church members Chuck and Linda Boyd, passed away within the last year. The Boyd family has made a generous bequest to St. Matthew's, in their memory (see p. 3).

We were saddened to learn that our rector, Andreas, will be leaving us as of November 17. When Andreas and Anya arrived on September 13, 2013, everyone was so excited to be having a fresh start! Ten years have gone by very quickly, and now it is time for him to find new adventures; we will miss him tremendously, and wish him well on his new journey to Newfoundland. Stay tuned for more information regarding a farewell catered dinner, on Saturday, November 18, in the Parish Hall.

Recently, we welcomed the Oasis Women's Choir, who are renting our Church space on Tuesday evenings for their choir practice (more on p. 17).

Over the last several months we have welcomed many members of St. James' Church, who have been joining us for worship and fellowship. We are enjoying all the wonderful new relationships that are being formed, and look to the future with optimism. (see photo, p. 8)

SINGING THE LORD'S SONG IN A STRANGE LAND



The I83rd Synod of the Diocese of Huron London, ON

May 28-29, 2023

The I83rd Synod of the Diocese of Huron was held on May 28-29th, 2023. It was a HYBRID meeting, meaning there were delegates on-site in London, and delegates using the internet- based ZOOM platform, from the comfort of their respective homes. For us, here at St. Matthew's, Rev. Andreas, Rev. Glenda and I opted for 'in person' participation and Rev. Cathy zoomed along at home. Joining us in London as well, as an observer, was parishioner, Nadine Donlon. I would be remiss if I failed to note the **Deacon's Table** at Synod and the mountain of brand new socks and underclothing for the homeless that grew around that table on the first morning of Synod [see next page]. I felt so proud just *knowing* that part of that "mountain" was created by 'you', our St. Matthew's community, because of your beautiful spirit and generosity. Your response to Our Deacons, Glenda and Cathy, when they requested your support for the **Synod Deacon's Project,** literally spoke "volumes".





Synods are in fact meant to be "transformative events" that lead to a "renewal" in the life of the Church. In other words, after a Synod occurs, the Church should emerge somehow as 'changed'. At Synod 2023, we pondered the present shape and future direction of our Diocese of Huron. We discussed topics such as revising and expanding our policies and practices in terms of ensuring Safe and Healthy Churches; we voted on changes and updates to some canons of our Church (i.e., changes to our church law, also known as 'Canon Law'.) A number of changes were by way of amendments, for example, to allow for the use of electronic files as well as paper files; we also heard a financial report indicating that the Diocese is in good financial shape at the moment, but sadly, it is the closure of some churches and the selling of their properties that has contributed to our Diocese's current financial stability. Of course, the diocesan finance department is well aware (as we are, here at St. Matthew's), of the relentless rising cost of property insurance, and the diocese has put aside monies for financial assistance to those churches in need of such support.

Perhaps the most highly considered topic at Synod, however, had to do with our *mission* and *ministry*, particularly, in terms of what we mean when we say that we need to become a more <u>diverse</u> church. To this end, we welcomed a guest speaker of African descent, Bishop Lusa from London, England, who shared his own thoughts and experiences of *diversity* in our churches and encouraged us to do better at welcoming *diverse* peoples into our churches. He reminded us that in the church and at the table, "Jesus is the Host and 'we' are **all** guests." This seemed to really strike a chord with delegates. Now..... this topic of DIVERSITY wasn't just pulled out of the air....so, I need to, just for a moment, take a step back at this juncture to help us recall the *journey* we have been on since our Bishop, Todd Townshend, was installed as the I4th Bishop of the Diocese of Huron in January of 2020. During the **2020** Synod that followed his installation, Bishop Todd laid out his "vision" for the Diocese of Huron for the next **four** years, which would bring us to **2024**.

The 'Strategic Goal' that he laid out was that we begin to shift our central focus from operations in terms of "merely keeping things going", and shift it to: renewal and new creation. So he asked us to review, revisit, how we have always been 'doing' church, and asked us to 'think outside the box' and embrace his vision for our future by becoming a learning church, a just church, a diverse church, a new church. He asked us to make a real commitment to focus on a new way of 'being church'. In doing so, he urged us to look to our ancient attitudes, practices, and habits, and RE-envision them for this new age in which we live.

Jump back now to Synod 2023 with a focus on becoming a diverse church. As Bishop Todd emphasized, we need to come closer to the diversity within the world-wide Anglican Communion as a whole, and closer to the demographic of our very own neighbourhoods. So......What will that look like for US here at St. Matthew's? What does becoming a diverse church mean for US? It may sound like a monumental task because embracing diversity doesn't necessarily happen automatically. For example, it goes against our very instinct to purposely seek out people who are 'not' like us. And so, we have to be intentional about it, think outside the box and find creative ways to invite and welcome folks of different cultures and race and language and gender preferences and abilities and disabilities and diverse interests. So...we need to be intentional and creative in how we go about becoming a 'diverse' church. As Bishop Todd suggested, "At one level, diversity may be nothing more than adding variety to a 'stale' pattern of language or music; at a deeper level, it is a summons to seriously question some of our assumptions about 'difference'."

Synods are meant to be "transformative events" that lead to a renewal in the life of the Church. In other words, after a Synod occurs, the Church should emerge somehow as 'changed'. So ... Where Are We Now? You know, in my past 4 years as your delegate to Synod, I have watched St. Matthew's • 'renew' and 'change' from one Synod to the next. I have witnessed how we have responded and continue to respond to the nudging of God's Spirit: *In the midst of a pandemic, our numbers • increased dramatically by all standards, given our "off and on church closures". The face and culture of St. Matthew's is shifting. We ARE already engaged in a time of change and renewal and it's good to be • here. From conversations I have had with fellow parishioners, it seems that Covid 19 has been an invitation to a spiritual deepening and at times, a spiritual awakening We have grown and continue to grow as a 'learning' church, learning through our church book studies and reflections. Smaller church groups are emerging for spiritual based gatherings. Folks are coming to know God and not just know about God; We are learning and embracing new ways of collaborative leadership roles in our various We have grown as a 'just' church...making it an integral part of our services to acknowledge that the land on which we stand is not ours, but a sharing by our Indigenous peoples. We are doing even more (than we possibly ever thought we could) to reach out to new 'less fortunate' groups of people that are coming to our attention.

And now we begin, and in some ways, continue our growth in becoming a 'diverse' church... always remembering that 'embracing diversity' is not a program... it's a process; always remembering that we must pray to be open to the nudging of the Spirit who has led us so well, thus far.

I look forward to this next phase of the journey with each of you. I cannot thank you enough for your faith in me as your current Lay-Delegate to Synod. ~Carol



Rev'd Cathy's Corner

Outreach Ministry at St. Matthew's.

Hiatus House: We continue to collect items that they have told us they need the most. Like most charitable places, they are experiencing lack of storage for all the items that are gathered by generous folks. No longer do they collect small items like we have saved from hotel rooms. Look for a list from Sue Bernard and Louise Davis regarding their current needs. These folks make the contact and the delivery.

Feeding the Hungry: We continue to collect items for the food cupboard found in the Narthex / Foyer. We support, at the moment Windsor Homes Coalition and Street Help. We still have Downtown Mission and the Welcome Centre when it was in the west end. Sometime during the winter we will canvas the congregation regarding where we think the food should be going. Street Help needs items for their food bags which means items that do not heed either cooking or refrigeration. So for delivery purposes it makes sense to support the first two agencies mentioned above since there are close together. Again Louise and Sue take care of this sorting and delivery to these locations.



Lent. 2020

Marlborough Breakfast & Nutrition Programme: We are in Grab and Go for our hot breakfast on Monday mornings. We arrive, in teams, at 7am to cook grilled cheese sandwiches which are put into foil bags to keep them hot. Then we add fruit juice boxes and cheese strings to the choices for the kids. The smiles and cries of Thanks so much! Warm the heart. Add to that we take 6 dozen muffins every Monday which are used as needed throughout the week for kids who do not have enough to eat - either breakfast or arrive without a lunch. So if you feel called by God to be the hands of lesus and are willing to



become part of a team of cooks or bakers of muffins at home, please speak to Cathy or call 519-966-5729 and she will add you to the schedule in January. Cooks go every 5 to 6 weeks and muffins a few times a school year. Another way to help is to make a donation of funds through your envelope to help with the cost of the ingredients. We also get underwear and socks for the kids who come to school with wet feet or little ones who have an accident at school.

Southwest Detention Centre: Over twenty years ago, St. Matthews began to support the chaplaincy at the old Windsor Jail with the Lenten Card collection and items that the chaplain used with the inmates. For several years the Sunday School made and decorated heart shaped cookies and valentines for the inmates which Cathy delivered, with the chaplain, to the inmates at the old Jail. Then the new Centre was built and regulations changed. With the idea from one of the



Cos (Corrections Officers) and Cathy the **Backpack programme** began and is now providing items of necessity to those inmates with NFA (homeless - no fixed address). Hygene packs, towel & washcloth, TP, socks and underwear go into the backpack. The Sewing **Programme** was interrupted by Covid but it means 3 instructors go to the Centre and assist women inmates in the use of a sewing



machine and they create items for their own use. Some of these are pillow cases, eyeglass cases, discharge bags for personal items rather than only the clear plastic bag provided by the Centre. Only inmates that earn the right to go to the Monday afternoon sessions attend. We are starting again Sept 25, and the women are asking "when are the ladies coming back?" This Outreach programme is the pricey one: fabric is expensive even when we get it as cheaply as possible, and backpacks are out of sight. Do you sew? Would you like to help with this valuable ministry? Even one more instructor would mean only twice a month for each of us. Talk to Cathy MacKendrick, Danielle Richer, Ann Hucal, Jean Muhleisen, or Jeannie Hopkins about it.

Serving as an ordained deacon in God's church is a deeply meaningful and fulfilling vocation, and what it means to me is a unique and personal contemplation of my faith, my calling, and faith-filled experiences. As my 10th Anniversary of Ordination approaches on November 28th, I offer this reflection.

From a very young age, growing up in Calgary, Alberta, I felt a calling to ordained ministry. However, being raised in the Roman Catholic tradition precluded that this would be an impossible undertaking, much to my dismay. Consistent with my desire to be of service to God's people, I pursued a career in the field of Social Work. Subsequent to my initial six years working in the field, I obtained my Master's Degree. The majority of my years thereafter were spent working as a clinical therapist at Windsor Regional Hospital in the field of adult mental health, while concurrently engaged in conducting a private practice, along with teaching in the School of Social

Work at the University of Windsor from 1984 to 2006. I thoroughly loved teaching undergraduate students and supervising master level students, impressing upon them always that we are bio-psychosocial-spiritual beings.

Throughout all those years, the feeling that I was being called to ordained ministry never really left me. One day, in 2010, I happened to read an article in the Windsor Star about All Saints Anglican Church and its Rector, The Reverend Kim Van Allen. By this time, I was no longer a practising Roman Catholic and had been seeking an inclusive, eucharist based, spiritual home. To make a long story short...I found it! I felt deeply that it was all part of God's plan and three years later, I was ordained as an Anglican Deacon. Five years ago, I found my way to St. Matthew's.

The word 'deacon' is derived from the Greek word diakonos which is a standard ancient Greek word meaning "servant", "minister", or "messenger". I love how the Diocese of Niagara describes deacons as "icons of servanthood (servants of the world on behalf of the church), agents of the bishop, and leaders who encourage baptismal ministry within their parish." So, my ministry is fundamentally about service to others. It means dedicating my life to assisting and guiding members of my faith community (and beyond) on their spiritual journeys. While 'service to others' can take many forms, I am particularly drawn to pastoral care....caring for and nurturing the spiritual well-being of our people within our parish, (and beyond), providing guidance, comfort, and support during life's challenges and in celebration of life's joys. I refer to this as 'in-reach'. I am also drawn to 'out-reach' programs, particularly with those in the downtown corridor who are shelter-deprived and/or are experiencing addiction. I also really enjoy coordinating our annual parish Christmas Angel Tree Program. My role is also about sharing the teachings and message of our faith tradition with others. This not only means proclaiming the gospel, but also living it out in my daily life. I am, as well, a member of our St. Matthew's pastoral team. It is a blessing to work alongside our rector and fellow deacon. Together, we play a part in building and nurturing a sense of community within our church. We help to foster relationships among members, helping to promote unity, and helping to create a welcoming and inclusive environment for all.

Of course, as in life, there are times when serving as an ordained deacon can have its challenges. But greater still, it brings with it immense rewards, a sense of spiritual fulfillment, a sense of purpose, and a constant reminder that my calling is all part of God's loving plan for me. How deeply grateful I am and how very honored I am, to have been called to the diaconate and called to minister within such a faithfilled, loving, inclusive community - St. Matthew's.

My Continued Journey to Fight Childhood Cancer **by Paul Allsop**

During August of this year I joined over 26,000 riders across Canada in **The Great Cycle Challenge- Canada**, to raise funds for Sick Kids Hospital, Toronto, and to join in their battle to rid the world of childhood cancers.



Children should be living their lives not fighting for them! Cancer is the largest killer of children in Canada; 27 children are diagnosed with

cancer every week. In my six years riding in this challenge I have raised \$15,300 and ridden 2,717 Kms.

The kids in active treatment at Sick Kids are our focus throughout the ride, as we regularly get messages from them, rooting us on to reach our goals. As we reach significant levels of mileage and funding goals they honour us with badges for each level of the challenge.

This contact with the children encourages the riders to ride on, knowing that research funded by this challenge has developed new treatments that have made a difference. In the seven years of the ride 20,179,00 Kms have been ridden and over \$39,000,000, have been raised for Sick Kids.

My results have not been my success alone, but that of all the friends and family who continue to support my challenge year after year. You know who you are and I love and thank all of you for sticking with me through the past six years.

Oh, it's not all serious. My son's family bought me a bike jersey that reads: "Don't underestimate an Old Man on a Bike." Who's he calling an old man? See you again next year! **God Bless you all!**

You do get to see a few interesting things as you ride far and wide. This picture is of the Gordy Howe Bridge, under construction and due for completion in late 2024.

Everything I need to know, I learned from my Horse by Jody Ness

/ As a young child growing up in suburban Toronto, I was bitten by the horse bug ...

But it wasn't until I was 40 that I finally attained my childhood dream and bought my first horse. Cassie. Her show name was **Constant Comment** – named for the special spicy blend of tea I enjoy, and because people were always noticing her wherever we went. She jumped like a dream and we competed successfully in the amateur show circuit. Life was great, but the good times were about to change. Life threw me a couple of curveballs from which I feared I would never recover. Cassie became my best friend, my confidante, my shrink, my reason for living. She always seemed to know when I needed a "hug." Her soft mane was



always available to mop up my tears. Cassie taught me what I have learned to call an **Equestrian** Life Lesson: What do you do when you fall off a horse? You dust off your breeches and you climb back on.

And just when I thought I was "Back in the High Life", life conspired against me again, so here's the next **Equestrian Life Lesson: Don't count your ribbons before the show starts.** Coping with failure and disappointment had not been in the curriculum at Queen's University Business School. It was, however, another lesson to be learned in the show ring. That is: **Worrying about the jump you just knocked down won't help you get over the next one.**

This was when I changed horses, so to speak. I decided to try my hand at something completely different. I became an entrepreneur, a marketing and communications consultant, an actor, a model, a talent agent, an automotive journalist. I became whatever it took to pay the mortgage and the board bill – not necessarily in that order.

This time the lesson Cassie taught me was to take a chance: You can't learn to ride sitting on the ground. Sometimes you just have to climb on, hang on, and keep moving forward.

Time passed and eventually I lost my special partner. Cassie had done everything she could to help me heal and grow into a better, stronger person.

Since then, I've had a number of special equine teachers who have continued with my lessons: Wheels, High Life, Dexter, Lester and Kir Royale. Today, horses are still my passion, and I still ride. And if you miss me at church sometimes on Sunday mornings, it's probably because I'm either competing or judging. I hope my Equestrian Life Lessons may resonate with you too!
