Holy Chalice or Holy Grail? By Jody Ness

Maybe you believe that Indiana Jones found it. Or maybe you prefer the Monty Python version. In any case, the cup that Jesus used at the Last Supper is the stuff of many fascinating, colourful, mysterious and varied stories. The word chalice comes from the Greek *kalus* which means *cup*. In Christian tradition, we believe the original Holy Chalice was the vessel that Jesus used at the Last Supper to share wine with his disciples. *"After supper, Jesus took the cup of wine. And when he had given thanks, he offered it to them and said 'Drink this, all of you. This is my blood of the <i>new covenant'...*" Gospel writers Matthew, Mark and Luke, as well as the apostle Paul, all wrote about its role at the Last Supper. Was it also the vessel that Joseph of Arimathea used to collect Jesus' blood at the crucifixion? Regardless, it is the very basis of our Anglican Holy Eucharist or Communion. But have you ever wondered what it was made from? Gold? Silver? Glass? With encrusted jewels?

Not likely. More possibly it was a simple household cup made of clay pottery. Archeologists, scholars and treasure hunters have long searched for the original chalice. Since medieval times, some believe it to be housed in the Spanish Cathedral in Valencia. Or is it still in the Church of the Holy Sepulchre? By the 12th century, the "graal" or grail had become a miraculous artifact associated with the legend of King Arthur. In common parlance, "searching for the Holy Grail" has become synonymous with a quest for something very desirable yet impossible.

Here at St Mathew's, we are blessed to have four beautiful chalices from which we can receive the blood of Christ as part of the Holy Eucharist. Next time you receive communion, maybe take a look at the chalice and see if you can identify which one it is:

This is a new section, where parishioners get to ask Rev'd Gilles anything that they would like to learn about him, his ministry, or our church practices

The Journey: Could you tell us a little about what a chalice and a paten are, and in particular, share with us some background about yours?

Rev'd Gilles:

The name **chalice** comes from the Greek *kalus* which simply translates as "cup". We feel that with this name having a Greek origin, this cup still has a very particular dignity. It is intended to receive the consecrated wine. **Paten** comes from the Latin *patena* which could be translated as "flat." The somewhat clever name of patène, in French, also tells us that this is a dish that is not ordinary. It is intended to receive the consecrated bread, a very special bread too, since it is unleavened like the one that Jesus and the Jews used to celebrate Passover. The chalice, into which a little wine mixed with water has been poured, and the paten, bearing broken and shared wheat bread, allow us to commune with the God of life. **He who eats this Bread and drinks this Wine will have eternal life within him.**

Usually a church has different chalices which have been offered by parishioners over the years, especially to the memory of a loved one. As for priests, at the time of ordination, the bishop presents each new priest with a chalice, a paten, and a Bible saying: "Receive this Bible and this chalice and paten as signs of the authority given you to preach the word of God and to administer his holy sacraments. Do not forget the trust committed to you as a priest of the Church of God." (BAS p.649).

The base of the Chalice that I received from my family for my ordination on June 4, 2022, is engraved with the names of my parents around the top of the inscription, and the names of my brothers and sisters who have died, at the bottom **(see photo, previous page).** Each time I preside with this chalice, I offer it in Thanksgiving for the gift of life and for this vocation received as a gift from God, and for my family. I offer it for each and every member of the community gathered, with their prayer intentions for the entire community, and for our Church.

"How can I repay the Lord for all the good he has done to me? I will lift up the cup of salvation, I will call on the name of the Lord" (Ps 115:12). Every time, while celebrating the Holy Eucharist, I raise the cup of the blood of the new covenant, and I give thanks for this immense gift that He has given me: to be a priest of Jesus Christ, me, His humble and unworthy servant.

The Journey asked them to introduce themselves, and briefly talk about how they see their ministry:



Mary Louise Drake: Why did I agree to be a warden? Frankly I am not sure why I agreed. However, I did feel the calling to become more active in the mission of St. Matthew's. The departure of Andreas and arrival of a new parish priest and the merging of St. Matthew's and St. James' churches have thrust all of us into a state of change, which can be uncomfortable. I hope to work with the wardens, Rod and Mary Lou, and with Gilles, to formulate and evolve parish goals. I am excited about new fundraising activities, reaching out and connecting with our local community, and growing as a unified parish. With your assistance, I believe that we can change from feeling uncomfortable to feeling that we are moving forward together, in unity, to tackle new projects and achieve common goals. The commissioning of our 2024 Parish Council took place on Sunday February 11, 2024 during the 10 am Service.



Stories From the Street

As many of you know, I am part of the Street Outreach Program under the organization and direction of the Saint Vincent de Paul Society. As part of an outreach team of three, on a rotation, I walk the streets of downtown Windsor in search of those who are without a place to call 'home'. My job is the same as the other outreach workers. It is not to judge; it is simply to care for and to offer what we have, in hope of making life just a little easier for someone, if even only for a few hours. Today, I thought I would share a story with you to give you a glimpse of life on the streets.

(The story was originally printed in the St. Vincent de Paul – Windsor Essex Central Council Newsletter/Dec. 2023. I have paraphrased the story to ensure further protection of identity, and have also added my own reflection.)

Allie

Our hearts break each time we find her. Allie has been on the streets for longer than the very few years that the *Street Outreach Ministry* has been in existence. I estimate that she might be around 33 years old. Her two children, born a year apart, were each apprehended by CAS (Children's Aid Society) within minutes of their birth. Sadly, Allie has never been able to maintain sobriety for more than a few days at most, and it has not been for lack of trying. "She's got it really bad" is a phrase often spoken by those trying to help 'it' being her addiction.

Many times she has been found wandering about without shoes, a coat, and sometimes less. Last winter it was not uncommon for her to go through one or two of our freely given coats in one day. Being the sweet, kind-natured person that she is, Allie would give her coat to a shivering friend or even a stranger, who she felt needed the coat more than she did. (The poor giving to the poor. It kind of takes your breath away.) I heard more than once from other Street Outreach Workers, who have known Allie longer than I have, that they truly believe that her guardian angel has been working overtime to keep her alive. Someone always seems to 'show up' just in the nick of time to pull Allie out of a dumpster, or a rainsoaked ditch; someone with warm clothing, food and a hot beverage, along with words of understanding and comfort. Allie is just one of the reasons we continue to do what we do, looking into back alleys, bushes and dumpsters. We just never know where we will find a soul who needs our help.

In this ministry I am so often reminded of Matthew's Gospel and the story of 'The Lost Sheep'. If you recall, the Pharisees and the Scribes were grumbling and saying, "This fellow (referring to Jesus), welcomes sinners and eats with them". Jesus stops the crowd and begins to tell the story of how a Shepherd left his flock of *ninety-nine* sheep to go and find *one* lost sheep. This parable displays the sacred meaning of God seeking

out the lost sinner and rejoicing when they are found. I believe that the parable teaches us to cherish and care for those who have lost their way in life, to find them and help them know, beyond a shadow of a doubt, that their lives matter.

Thank you, my beloved St. Matthew's family. Thank you for doing your part in showing love and caring for the *lost*. Thank you for your donations of clothing and footwear, and monetary gifts to purchase toiletries. Thank you for your prayers for this ministry. *Thank you for taking care of Allie*. **There is always hope**.



LENTEN GROUP — Bless Them, Change Me By Lori Maisonville

I am glad to have attended a prayer/reflection group for four Saturday mornings last month, facilitated by Rev'd Gilles, and discussing material and reflection questions from the small book by **Rowan Williams: Being Disciples ... Essentials of the Christian Life.** Some topics I found engaging included: forgiveness, stillness, receiving & giving, consumerism, among others. A theme that stood out loudly for me was our group facilitator reminded us that: life is sometimes very difficult and challenging, or, the mystery of life. As I reflect on this notion, I feel my greatest challenges in life, I believe afforded me incredibly rich and valuable opportunities to grow parts of myself, and accept the love and support of others. Someone once gently shared with me: Pain shared is half the pain; and success shared is doubled.

Initially, what came to mind when I thought of participating in this prayer/reflection group were practices that I already have established: read from a daily meditation book each mornings (one page of inspiration); pray with gratitude, when facing challenges because when I surrender, I'm coachable; write (or sometimes draw) in my gratitude journal each night when I reflect on my day; pray the serenity prayer, often, daily—and sometimes pray is longer version too, I often pray the rosary when I go for a walk in nature, or sit in my favorite place outside; and pray grace before my meals; attending several retreats, enjoy silent reflection times, being alone in nature; I have prayed over at the end of a body massage, and been asked to give a blessing at the end of an energy work session, for another; pray to St. Christopher when I travel, to St. Anthony when I lose something or when I'm feeling lost, myself, and the Prayer of St. Francis (make me a channel of your peace...) when I volunteer at the Hospice of Windsor-Essex.

As I've matured in my prayer life, my focus seems to have shifted from a fast-paced busy life of "I need/please help", to a slower pace of life with more awareness and a focus on being thankful you for all I've been given, and continue to receive right now. Here and now.

EASTER SUNDAY March 31, 10 am


Jesus Christ is Risen Today! A full church was singing with the choir during the procession, ready to celebrate the Sunday of the Resurrection.

Southwest Detention Centre: We welcome Peggy Baumgarden from Church of the Epiphany, Kingsville, to our **sewing** instructors making us two teams of three each. These folks cut some more fabric recently and received some donations of fabric from several sources. Thanks so much. **Inmate support** has been boosted with clothing, and outwear donations, as well as jigsaw puzzles. Playing cards are also a highly prized item with the inmates. The weekly sewers can take those donations when they go. **Backpack** ministry for released inmates with no fixed address (NFA). A set was taken in February for those folks and we have some new volunteers who put those together and do some shopping. Thanks to Gail, Danny, and Jayne for joining in with this team. The inmates are asking for large size only now, so our life is easier. Many hands make light work. In the gospels Jesus tells us that when we visit the prisoners, we are visiting Him.

Marlborough Breakfast Programme: We continue to serve a Grab and Go Breakfast of warm grilled cheese sandwiches, cheese strings, and fruit juice. Recently, with the celebration of Ramadan we are not preparing the same quantity but will return to our usual amount after Eid.

Food for the Hungry: Thanks to everyone who brings and donates a food item for The Homeless Shelter, Windsor Homes Coalition, and the Welcome Centre all in the downtown area of the city.




